German Notes

Dear Colleagues,

I am excited about the past year reorganizing AATG SC, of which I became president in August 2010. Karen Patinella served our organization well and we will certainly miss her at the helm. Karen was instrumental in collecting late dues and increasing membership.

The group had several meetings this year, one on March 20, 2010 at Wofford College one at Boiling Springs High School on Saturday, May 15th. Ruta Couet as the foreign language liaison for the South Carolina Department of Education and Petra Reuter from the German consulate in Miami spoke about the need for German teachers in South Carolina to continue to offer the A2 German proficiency examination. The SCFLTA Fall workshop at Cardinal Newman High School featured a middle school teacher from Lexington County, Caroline Oates, who told the group of her experiences at the Concordia Language Villages in Minnesota. Several AATG members were present at the most recent SCFLTA annual meeting in West Columbia in February.

The year has been one of transition with several new officers. The AATG Vice president/President elect is Bryan Kirby from Christ Church Episcopal School in Greenville and the Secretary Sarah Floyd from Lexington High School. Our new officer in charge of membership is John Littlejohn of Coastal Carolina University and testing chair is Dr. Wiebke Strehl, of USC (Columbia) who assumed the position from Michael Buerstner (who is the new German teacher at Irmo High School). Dr. Lara Ducate from USC (Columbia) remains treasurer and Harris King the AATG representative to SCFLTA.

I attended both the national AATG business meeting and the reception during the ACTFL conference in Boston in November. We are saddened by the retirement announcement of Helene Zimmer-Loew, who has served the national organization as its Executive Director tirelessly for decades. We wish Helene all the best in her retirement.



My sincere thanks to Bryan Kirby, who has established an AATG SC Facebook page onto which I submit all communications from AATG headquarters. In addition, under his direction, we now have a blog that is linked to the AATG SC website, the maintenance of which Dr. Johannes Schmidt from Clemson University has graciously assumed from Art Lader at Aiken High School. ¿Serás lingüista o literario?

En años recientes ha habido un debate en el mundo de la enseñanza del español entre el campo lingüístico y el campo literario en relación a cómo es la mejor manera para enseñar el idioma. Aunque se estudia los dos en los programas formales, el aprendiz históricamente tenía que seguir una carrera u otra. Los literarios dicen que enseñar solo la gramática del idioma no sirve porque el que estudia así nunca aprende de la cultura ni el idioma culto. Otro de los problemas entre los dos campos es que literatura vieja no representa el idioma hablado hoy en día en la calle. El argumento al contrario es que no se quiere instruir y trabajar con el aprendiz para que salga con un léxico de obrero común sin educación. ¿Cómo entonces se enseña el idioma actual pero a la vez culto? Se debe cumplir esta meta si se quiere que los aprendices del sistema de educación en los Estados Unidos y más los de Carolina del Sur sean reconocidos como personas eruditas con buena educación. La recomendación aquí es que se enfoca en el idioma y se usa la literatura para hacerlo. Por hacer eso, desafortunadamente, se debe decir adiós a los clásicos como Cervantes y incluso autoras lujosas como Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz y dejarlos para estudios más avanzados cuando el aprendiz ya tiene dominio del idioma. No es la intención del autor de decir que los clásicos no son importantes, sino que cuando empezamos con estos antes de que el aprendiz tenga un dominio del idioma, solo produce frustración y el filtro afectivo sube aun más en el aula. Los neófitos al lenguaje no ganan nada si van a la calle y tratan a un vendedor como <<vuestra merced>>. Tampoco es apropiado que le traten de << ¿ke onda wey? ¿ke haces

karnal?>>¹. Para encontrar el medio que resulta en el aprendiz letrado, el autor recomienda obras modernas como las del argentino, Marco Denevi o la costarricense Cecilia Hidalgo Calderón que serán más de uso en la enseñanza del idioma y se puede analizar los ejemplos lingüísticos también.

En <<Los fracasados>> por Denevi hay una serie de conversaciones entre los personajes principales, que son una pareja casada. En el salón de enseñanza, se puede investigar no solamente las teorías literarias, sino también la dinámica entre esposo y esposa. Lo ventajoso de usar cuentos modernos como éste es que las oraciones no son siempre completas y perfectamente formadas, sino representan la manera en que habla una pareja casada. El siguiente es un fragmento del cuento:

-¿Y bien? ¿No dices nada?

- ¿Qué tengo que decir?

- Miren la contestación. ¿Tres días que faltas de casa y no tienes nada que decir? Marido, te previne que no volvieras con las manos vacías.

- Ya lo sé. Si he vuelto es porque cumplí tus órdenes.

-Mis órdenes. Mis consejos, diría yo. Y entonces ¿por qué estás así, hecho un trapo?

- ¿Acaso debería estar alegre?

-Me parece a mí.

-Pues ya ves. No estoy alegre.

Estoy arrepentido.

- Vaya. Te duró poco el valor.

- ¿Qué valor? Lo hice porque tú me obligaste...

(Los fracasados – Marco

Denevi)

¹ Aunque no es otro idioma, la ortografía contemporánea que usan los jóvenes no se puede limpiar cuando está mostrando el punto de vista mostrado aquí. Sería << ¿Qué onda, güey? ¿Qué haces carnal? >>

La conversación continúa pero se puede ver que hay mucho más de la vida ordinaria que en las conversaciones inventadas que muchas veces se ve en un libro de texto para una clase de español. Lo beneficioso de trabajar con idiomas y con cuentos es que se pueden usar para cubrir una variedad de temas y materias. En el mundo de la educación, la mayoría de las conferencias o talleres profesionales enfatizan la importancia de la interdisciplinariedad. Hay tanto adentro de unas páginas o incluso un fragmento como acaba de leer que se debe usar el texto para integrarlo con la vida y con las otras materias de los aprendices

¿Cómo entonces se mezcla las materias de otros departamentos con la enseñanza del español? Se enseña la psicología por medio del análisis de la relación que tiene la pareja: se puede comparar las relaciones de los alumnos o las de sus padres. Lingüísticamente, también hay puntos de interés: El léxico es de clase baja-media, pero a la vez no es lenguaje de la basura; aunque el léxico no es estándar propiamente, sin embargo todavía tiene cierto prestigio sociolingüístico. La conversación está llena de contexto pragmático y orden semántico que existe encima de la gramática y léxico. No es decir que no se utiliza este diálogo para mejorar y aumentar una instrucción de gramática. Nota el uso de palabras interrogativas, verbos en infinitivo, presente, pretérito indefinido, pretérito perfecto, imperativo, pretérito imperfecto del subjuntivo, potencial y más. Se enseña la cultura y la comparación entre un diálogo matrimonial con lo que sepan los escolares de las normas culturales hacia los papeles tradicionales matrimoniales. Siempre hay el estudio de símbolos desde una perspectiva de una teoría literaria. Por ejemplo, se podría investigar el rol de la mujer mostrado en este cuento. ¿Tiene valor feminista? Aunque el pasaje mencionado antes no tiene mucho que ofrecer políticamente, si se lee todo el cuento hay muchos ejemplos políticos, de clase social, (Y) de religión. Mientras los aprendices están investigando esos temas en la literatura, están a

la vez mejorando sus habilidades con respeto al lenguaje.

Otro ejemplo de una conversación entre un prisionero capturado y un inspector en *El cautivo de san Anselmo* por Cecilia Hidalgo Calderón:

-Vamos, dinos ¿cuántos hombres encontraste dentro del buque?

Un sudor frío recorría la espina dorsal del prisionero quien tartamudeaba.

-Bu... bueno, encontré ...tres, pe....pero quizá el otro cayó al mar. Vi que hubo pelea entre ellos.

- ¿Cuál faltaba? , dinos su nombre. Todos te eran conocidos porque los tratabas en cada desembarque.

(Hidalgo C.
Capítulo IV)

Otra vez, la conversación continúa pero se ve que existe una interacción de interrogación. Se puede comparar la dinámica entre el poder del gobierno y el prisionero. Investiga el léxico y construcción de las oraciones con respeto al nivel de educación de un inspector policiaco y un criminal común. No hay espacio en este ensayo corto para investigar toda la novela de Hidalgo Calderón, pero hay pasajes que serían útiles para introducir biología, estudios de la naturaleza, temas náuticos, convenciones culturales, sociología etc.

Usar la literatura no-debe estar en conflicto con los lingüistas que quieren enfocarse en el idioma. Es algo que ayuda al principiante extranjero de entender el idioma adentro de la cultura vista por la literatura. No se debe temer la literatura como parte de la metodología de enseñanza y usarla para abrir el mundo al aprendiz. Esto es un indicador de un docente ejemplar. ¡Vaya y cambie al mundo!

- a letter of recommendation from your principal or supervisor
- a two-three page typed document in which you clearly articulate your proposed goals and objectives including specific information about how your experience will benefit students and improve your instruction
- printed material (web site printout, printed brochure) from sponsoring organization
(*A self-designed program will be viewed less favorably than a program sponsored by an accredited institution.*)

A letter of acceptance into the program will be required before the award funds are disbursed, but is not necessary for the application process. All nomination materials must be typewritten and **received by November 1, 2011.**
